

#### > EXODUS 20:12

<sup>12</sup>Honor your father and your mother so that you may have a long life in the land that the LORD your God is giving you.

#### > 2 SAMUEL 15:7-14

When four years had passed, Absalom said to the king, "Please let me go to Hebron to fulfill a vow I made to the LORD. 8 For your servant made a vow when I lived in Geshur of Aram, saying: If the LORD really brings me back to Jerusalem, I will worship the LORD in Hebron." 9 "Go in peace," the king said to him. So he went to Hebron. <sup>10</sup> Then Absalom sent agents throughout the tribes of Israel with this message: "When you hear the

sound of the ram's horn, you are to say, 'Absalom has become king in Hebron!" <sup>11</sup> Two hundred men from Jerusalem went with Absalom. They had been invited and were going innocently, for they did not know the whole situation. 12 While he was offering the sacrifices, Absalom sent for David's adviser Ahithophel the Gilonite, from his city of Giloh. So the conspiracy grew strong, and the people supporting Absalom continued to increase. 13 Then an informer came to David and reported, "The hearts of the men of Israel are with Absalom." 14 David said to all the servants with him in Jerusalem, "Get up. We have to flee, or we will not escape from Absalom! Leave quickly, or he will overtake us quickly, heap disaster on us, and strike the city with the edge of the sword."



## Day One **EPHESIANS 6:1**

In the fifth commandment, God called all children to honor their parents. In Ephesians, Paul repeated this command, but said it with different words. Children are called to obey their parents "in the Lord." This means that, if we want to be in right relationship with God—if we want to be in Christ—then obedience to our parents is right. For us to break this command is to be outside Christ, at least in a relational sense. God has ordained certain authorities on the earth as representatives of His authority, and the first and most essential of these is parents over their families. Parents may not be perfect—in fact, none ever are—but this doesn't change the fact that God requires children to obey. If we want to experience intimacy with God, then it is necessary that children respect the authority of their parents.

What does it mean to obey "in the Lord"?

## Day Two EPHESIANS 6:1



Children are to obey their parents for a very specific reason—because it is right. All people know that there is right and wrong. And though we may not agree with the standards, we all know, nonetheless, that certain things are simply right and wrong. Ultimately, *right* refers specifically to those things that are in line with God's standards. This certainly applies on a purely spiritual level, but beyond this, even according to the natural order of the world, it is clearly right that children must grow up under the authority of their parents in order to be healthy. Jesus lived the perfectly righteous life. He clearly pictured this through His obedience to the Father, and we are called to be like Christ.

What is the true standard of right and wrong?

Why is it right to obey your parents?

## Day Three **EPHESIANS 6:2**

The fifth commandment is unique from the other commandments, specifically because there is an associated promise. God said to obey your parents "so that you may have a long life in the land that the Lord your God is giving you" (Ex. 20:12). The promised land was a symbol of God's blessings on His people. God essentially told the people of Israel, "If you honor your parents, who are called to teach you the right ways to live, I will bless you! But if you refuse to honor your parents in living right lives, I will remove my blessings." The highest reason to obey God, as well as parents, is because it is right. However, God gave us another appropriate motivation—because we desire God's blessings in our lives. Today, if we disobey our parents, we should never expect to receive God's blessings. However, when we honor them, even though it may not be easy, we picture the submission of Christ to the Father's authority, and God will bless us in many ways.

## Day Four **EPHESIANS 6:2**

In Exodus 20:12, Scripture teaches that children are to honor their parents "so that." Anytime we see these words in Scripture, God is revealing to us the reason for the statement that comes before. Generally, all commands have a "so that"—because it's right to do what God says and we must always obey Him. But sometimes God gives a more specific reason. In the fifth command, the "so that" is specifically that God's people would receive His promises and live blessed lives. God is a God of covenants, and we live in relationship with Him according to the promises He has made. In this passage, Paul is emphasizing the importance of honoring our parents as a way to put ourselves in the position to receive God's promises. Of course, it ultimately comes down to trusting Christ. But we must realize that following Christ means obeying our parents iust as He did.

Why did God attach a promise to the fifth commandment?

## Day Five **EPHESIANS 6:3**



In this passage, Paul recounts the promise as recorded in Deuteronomy 5:16. The blessing God promised to those who obeyed their parents is that they would have a long life in the land God would give them, and that it would "go well." Students in middle school and high school have generally lived long enough to see patterns associated with kids and teens who obey versus those who don't. Generally speaking, for those who are rebellious and disobedient, life doesn't generally go well. But for those who are submissive and obedient—for those who learn from their parents and submit to authority—life generally goes much better. This is the way God has designed it, and if we want God's blessings, we must obey our parents.

Why does life generally not go well for disobedient children?
