

#### > MARK 10:13-22

- <sup>13</sup>People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. 14 When Jesus saw it, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me. Don't stop them, because the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. 15 Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." <sup>16</sup> After taking them in his arms, he laid his hands on them and blessed them
- <sup>17</sup>As he was setting out on a journey, a man ran up, knelt down before him, and asked him, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

- 18 "Why do you call me good?" Jesus asked him. "No one is good except God alone. 19 You know the commandments: Do not murder: do not commit adultery; do not steal; do not bear false witness; do not defraud; honor your father and mother."
- <sup>20</sup> He said to him, "Teacher, I have kept all these from my youth."
- <sup>21</sup>Looking at him, Jesus loved him and said to him, "You lack one thing: Go, sell all you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." 22 But he was dismayed by this demand, and he went away grieving, because he had many possessions.

Reality TV has been a staple in American entertainment for twenty years, and considering there are millions of people who continually tune in, it's not likely to go away anytime soon. One popular reality TV show has contestants working through challenging, complex obstacle courses to earn the title of American Ninja Warrior. To be in the kind of physical shape necessary to complete the course requires months, even years, of intense training. This is no small commitment.

We may not be competing for a title, but our lives revolve around our commitments just the same. A quick look at a typical week will reveal how committed we are to the things in our lives. Family, friends, schoolwork, athletics, a job, or practicing a hobby all call for a certain level of commitment. And there are challenges we must overcome associated with anything we'd pursue.

Our commitments reveal what we value—and who we love. In the Bible, we see God's commitment to us, and we find time and time again that, because of His great love for His people, God proved His commitment. We need to ask ourselves, how do we respond to that commitment?

# Day One LUKE 9:23

When Jesus called His disciples, He told them to leave what they were doing—whether they were fishing, collecting taxes, or otherwise and follow Him. Becoming a disciple of Christ involved their setting aside all the plans they'd previously made in order to learn from Him and to be a part of His ministry. This doesn't mean the disciples were forced to do things they didn't want to do and give up all the things they'd dreamed of. Instead, it meant learning to desire the things that are in line with Jesus and His purposes. The disciples followed because they wanted to, for they knew that to be with Christ was better than anything they would experience outside of Christ. Denying ourselves means denying our fleshly desires that are opposed to God's will for our lives. However, when we surrender to Christ, He gives us a new heart with desires that are in line with His kingdom purposes. This is one of the clearest ways to know we're truly followers of Christ-when we find that desires not in line with God's ways decrease, and in their place, right desires grow up in our hearts.

# Day Two LUKE 9:24



From an earthly perspective, certain things make sense. If something is valuable to us, then we need to protect it. If we want to keep something, we must store it in a safe place. And the most valuable thing we have is our lives. But the kingdom of God often works in an upside-down, paradoxical manner, and here is one of those instances. If we want to truly live, then we have to give our life away. Specifically what Jesus is saying is, if we try to hold on to this physical, temporary life, we'll experience eternal death. But if we give this life over to death, identifying with Jesus in His crucifixion, we'll receive an eternal life that is worth infinitely more.

# Day Three LUKE 9:25

The majority of people live for the here and now with little thought of the future. We eat our favorite foods and watch our favorite movies, we laugh with our friends and engage in our favorite pastimes. And all these things are good so long as we don't look to them for ultimate satisfaction. However, far too many people fail to see beyond these kinds of things. Sure, some people think about the future—working hard to make good grades to get into the best college or saving up to buy a car. But even these are desperately shortsighted. When we live for this life, whether it's today or twenty years from now, we miss the point of what Jesus has said. To live for this life—the present moment or further into the future—but to disregard eternity will leave us eternally empty. If we want to be truly rich, we must give up living for the present moment, and even saving for the future, at least as our source of ultimate happiness. Instead, we must live with God's eternal kingdom in view.

# Day Four LUKE 9:26

Shame is the painful emotion we experience when something we'd rather keep hidden is exposed. When Adam and Eve sinned, whereas before, because they were pure they had nothing to hide, now they understood that they were dirty and broken, so they hid—they felt ashamed. Jesus has called us to share the truth of the gospel with as many people as will listen. In fact, this is the mission we've been called to as His followers. Yet we live in a world where it's important to always be polite and there are certain topics that are off-limits, including religion, and if we were to share our faith, our friends may look down on us. This may be the case, but it doesn't change God's calling on our life, and we have this hard saying from Jesus. If we don't speak up for Him in this life, we can be sure that He won't speak up for us when we stand before God in judgment.

## Day Five

## **LUKE 9:27**



In the gospel of Mark, we read that some with Jesus wouldn't die until they saw the kingdom "come in power" (9:1). The kingdom of God exists when Jesus reigns. In the ultimate sense, God is sovereign, and He reigns everywhere. However, in the current age, He hasn't chosen to exercise His control in the fullest sense, and tragically, many people refuse to honor Him. However, one day all this will change, and everyone will bow before Jesus. When Christ began His ministry, He preached that the kingdom had come (Mark 1:15). Through His death and resurrection and with the coming of the Holy Spirit, God was working to fulfill the establishing of His kingdom, and when we submit to Christ—when He reigns in our lives—the kingdom has come powerfully to us.
