

DAILY DEVOTIONS



The 7 Arrows of **Bible Reading**



Day One DEUTERONOMY 6:4-5

Deuteronomy 6:4-9 is a passage of Scripture known as the Shema, which means specifically "to hear." Among the Jews, it became a confession of faith which they recited each day. As they repeated this over and over, they were reminded every day that there is one God. This is a reiteration of the first commandment to have no other gods-because there are no other gods. But it's not enough simply to believe this truth. True followers are called also to love God with all we are. When Jesus was asked which command of the 613 total commands in the Old Testament was the most important. He quoted these verses (Mark 12:29-30). If we are to follow Christ in the ways we are called, just like in the lives of Old Testament Israel, it is essential that we continually remember that there is one God and to love Him with all that we are.

Day Two DEUTERONOMY 6:6



There's nothing more frustrating than being told to do something you don't know how to do and not being told how to do it. If your dad said, "I want you to go to the garage and rebuild the transmission on the ol' truck," most of us wouldn't have a clue, and any effort to make it happen would result in pure frustration. Living in relationship with God and up to His standards is a task infinitely more difficult than rebuilding a transmission, and without clear direction, we'd never be able to do it. Thankfully, God gave us His word, and if we'll take it to heart, we can be a part of His family.

Day Three **DEUTERONOMY 6:7**

Earlier in the Ten Commandments, God called children to honor their parents. This command was associated with a promise—"so that you may have a long life in the land that the Lord your God is giving you" (Deut. 5:16). All along, God promised that His people would experience blessing when they obeyed Him from the heart, and it was the parents' responsibilities not only to follow God, but to teach their children to follow as well. The way this happens is that parents devote themselves to internalizing and living out God's laws first, and in turn, teach their children to do the same. Today, this is why it's so important for families to go to church and serve together, to worship and study the Bible together in the home, and together learn to apply Biblical principles in the home, at work, and at school. The way to grow in loving God is to have His Word at the center of our thinking all day, every day, no matter what we're doing.

At the time when this was written, there were very few copies of the law. The whole law was read to the people at the festivals, and the Jews' interpretation of this verse was that certain verses, those that were weighty and applied broadly to life, were to be written down and remembered. Today, many people do similar things. You may write your favorite verses on your notebook or set a verse as the wallpaper on your phone. Families often have artwork with Bible verses hanging on their walls. And many people memorize verses that are meaningful to them. Either way, the spirit of Deuteronomy 6:8 is that God's Word would literally be in our hands and in our brains. Not physically, of course! But in the ways we use our hands, the principles of God's law should be clearly seen. And in the ways we think, God's Word should always be at the center.
